Early 1900s Products

Imagine for a moment, the year is 1914 in Sioux City, Iowa. A gentleman named Lucius Garland Everist was doing a lively business, selling both coal and building supplies at the corner of First and Nebraska Streets. Imagine further if you were a builder, you could purchase everything from mantle brick to flue liners to sewer pipe (see left hand column). If you already had a home, both cooking and heating coal (13 types) were available for delivery in mule-drawn wagons. Sioux City was full of ambitious people, trading cattle and wares for what must have seemed like an endless flow of similar people heading west for a new life in the limitless region to the west. Note on the actual letterhead used in the 1900s above, Mr. Everist had two managers who were likely consumed with the daily pressures of buying and selling (at a profit, we are certain) to anyone who walked through the door. Customers, after all, were what made the business thrive! We look back and think of the difficulties of matching supply and demand in an era of unreliable telephones and telegrams and hand-written documentation.

Fast-forward a few years and three generations, the LGE brand is alive and thriving. We continue in the building materials business, albeit on a completely different scope and scale. As you read this, you may wonder how we managed to move the business forward through wars and depressions and 20 presidents (Taft was #27, Trump will be #47), and end up with such a solid workforce, steady customers, and a future that extends past the fifth generation of owner-managers.
